It is with pleasure that I once again report to members on the operations of the Children's Leukaemia & Cancer Research Foundation (Inc) for the year ended 30th June 2013.

Finance:

It is also a pleasure to report that the year under review we achieved an operating profit of \$935,642 against a budgeted expectation of \$330,000.

This is an outstanding result however, in respect to the specifics of the overall financial position I will leave that to the Treasurer to report on in greater detail regarding our operations for the past year.

Block Grant Funding:

We have completed the first year of our new block grant application for 2012 - 2015 - the 11th triennial block grant that we have funded - titled "Therapy & Molecular Genetics of Leukaemia in Infants" amounting to \$1,405,626.

We once again congratulate Professor Ursula Kees and her wonderful research team on their continued outstanding achievements both locally and internationally.

\$1M Recognition of Excellence Funding Grant:

We have now completed the first year of our second five year \$1M Recognition of Excellence Grant titled "Molecular Genetics of Childhood Tumours".

It was six years ago, as a result of excellent peer group reviews, that our Foundation provided additional funding of one million dollars to Professor Kees to allow another direction of research to be undertaken. Now a further \$1M has been provided by the Foundation.

CLCRF Fellowship:

This fellowship grant, awarded to Dr Alex Beasley to carry out research into "Targeting Therapy and Disease Outcomes in Paediatric Cancer", has been completed.

The Foundation's Committee of Management approved an application, to renew Dr Beasley's CLCRF Fellowship to carry out research into "Targeting Therapy and Disease Outcomes in Paediatric Cancer" over the next three years, requesting total funding of \$557,167.00.

Woolworths WA Children's Leukaemia & Cancer Research Fellowship:

This fellowship, funded at a cost of \$400K, is in recognition of the incomparable support that this Foundation receives from Woolworths WA.

Dr Mark Cruickshank, Senior Research Officer, has now completed his first year of the grant project titled "Identifying the Molecular Abnormalities in Childhood Leukaemia to Improve Treatment".

Woolworths WA:

It is with sadness I announce that, after a wonderful association that has lasted 30 years, Woolworths WA have formally advised us that their support is now concluded and they are moving in a different direction.

However, rather than being sad, it is, in fact, a celebration of how fortunate we have been to have this exceptional support over this long period of time and to have received over \$3.7 million which has been the mainstay of our research endeavours.

Community Activities:

Telethon Institute for Child Health Research:

I am pleased to once again acknowledge our wonderful relationship with the Telethon Institute for Child Health Research, the entity which administers the Children's Leukaemia & Cancer Research Laboratory and allows the research which we fund to actually happen.

During the past year we have formalised our funding partnership and, in particular, our "Research Grant Guidelines" by developing a new Memorandum of Understanding between the Institute and our Foundation.

Chairman's Report

Tele-Marketing Raffles

The Foundation completed three raffles during the year ending June 2013. Revenue from these raffles totalled \$713,754 which, after, deducting expenditure of \$484,308, resulted in a profit of \$229,445. Donations received via the raffles are included in the revenue figure.

Our raffles continue to be successful not only from a financial aspect, but they also help to increase our profile in the community around Australia. We currently have approximately 50,000 supporters on the raffle database.

Children's Leukaemia and Cancer Research Laboratory Report 2012/2013

Triennial Block Grant (2012 - 2015). Professor Ursula R Kees

Title: Therapy and Molecular Genetics of Leukaemia in Infants

While the survival rate for patients with childhood leukaemia has improved dramatically, approaching 5-year survival of 95% for some patient groups, several sub-types of leukaemia are refractory to current treatments. Furthermore, in cases where treatment is successful, the toxicity of the drugs results in severe acute side effects and long-term morbidity. Strikingly, in patients less than



three months at the time of diagnosis, the survival rate is only 30%. In many studies more intensive therapy was administered to infants with leukaemia to improve survival. Unfortunately, this led to a large number of toxic deaths, and did not improve overall survival. We urgently need to find novel therapy for these patients. Since treatments using highly toxic chemotherapies are not successful, understanding the biology of this disease holds the key.

In this study, we have generated a panel of 8 cell lines from patients with infant acute lymphoblastic leukaemia (iALL). We have performed genetic analyses using state-of-the art next generation sequencing technology (RNA-seq and exome-seq). Cell lines and primary iALL specimens from which they were originally derived were investigated. These studies were performed to gain novel insights into the genes that contribute to iALL disease progression and drug resistance. We confirmed the presence of a translocation at the MLL gene in iALL specimens and cell lines, which is known to confer poor prognosis for patients. We also found that infant patients inherited extremely rare polymorphisms in genes that are known to play a role in cancer. Importantly, these molecular studies identified several known cancer-causing genes as well as novel genes; many of which can be targeted by modern therapies to improve treatments of patients with iALL.

In addition to characterizing the genetic profile of iALL specimens and cell lines, we have screened the panel of iALL cell lines against 101 approved cancer drugs, which is the first comprehensive assessment that examined the drug response in iALL. The information obtained clearly showed that some of the currently used drugs did not kill iALL cells (e.g. Mercaptopurine and Methotrexate), while others were very effective, yet not used in contemporary protocols for patients (e.g. Romidepsin and Bortezomib). In addition, we have tested modern compounds that are presently in clinical trials for various cancers. These compounds are highly specific as they target particular genes that are altered in leukaemia cells. Therefore, these "targeted" drugs offer the potential to kill leukaemia cells with less toxic effects to the patient. Together, these studies have identified drugs that could be useful to treat iALL, including established anti-cancer drugs as well as new-generation drugs. These drugs are expected to provide great benefits in the treatment of patients with iALL.

Million Dollar Recognition Award (2012 - 2017) Professor Ursula R Kees Title: Molecular Genetics of Childhood Tumours

'NUT Midline carcinoma' or NMC, is a little known but extremely aggressive cancer that can affect people of any age, including children and newborn babies. Unlike leukaemia, this cancer arises in tissues of the lung, or throat, or abdomen, but not the blood. It is very rare but a number of children with NMC have been treated at Princess Margaret Hospital over the last 20 years. Unfortunately there is currently no effective treatment for NMC, and patients typically survive less than one year. The first report of this rare disease was published by Professor Kees in 1991, and our team of researchers continues to be one of only very few laboratories in the world studying the biology and treatment of NMC. There is only one recorded survivor of this disease and patients typically succumb within a matter of months. The rarity of the cancer, together with its aggressive clinical course, means that doctors have had little chance to develop effective strategies to treat patients. Treatments have essentially been adapted from protocols given to patients with similar cancers. Clearly this is not working for the patients. There are a large number of 'conventional' chemotherapy drugs available to treat such patients, but to date there has been no evidence to guide doctors as to which drugs might be effective. Thanks to the efforts of the team supported by CLCRF, we now have a small panel of cell lines from these rare patients, and they are ideally suited to determine the effectiveness of drugs. We included currently available cancer drugs as well as novel drugs in our screen. We could demonstrate that several of them have excellent activity against NMC. We plan to evaluate whether particular drug combinations would be of benefit, and endeavour to examine them in model systems. Using state-of-the-art genetic analyses to correlate these drug sensitivities to the genetics of each patient will allow us to generate further clues to understand the biology of this disease. The information obtained will be applied to the design of improved treatments.

CLCRF Research Fellowship (2010 - 2013) Dr Alex H Beesley

Title:Targeting Therapy and Disease Outcomes in Paediatric Cancer

Dr Beesley has been employed within the CLCRF Laboratory in the Division of Cancer and Leukaemia Research since 2003, and was awarded the inaugural CLCRF Research Fellowship in July 2010. This three-year Fellowship provided support for Dr Beesley to conduct research detailed under the CLCRF Triennial Block Grant and the Million Dollar Recognition Awards. He has been involved



in all aspects of the leukaemia research program and the management of staff and students during this time. In these studies we have been investigating the ways in which patients with leukaemia become resistant to certain therapies, in particular steroids such as dexamethasone. This class of drugs is one of the most important for the treatment of the disease and yet some patients develop resistance, which can lead to relapse. Our studies using bone marrow cells from leukaemia patients (grown in the test tube to generate cell lines) have helped us to identify some of the mechanisms associated with the development of steroid resistance. This includes specific changes to the metabolism of the cancer cells, which alters the way in which they use nutrients, for example sugar.

We are currently investigating these changes in greater detail using modern biochemical methods at the University of Western Australia, and also collaborating with researchers at the Children's Cancer Institute Australia in Sydney to identify new drugs that may be used to overcome steroid resistance in patients who have relapsed.

A second part of this study has been the development of 'biomarkers' that can help in the early identification of leukaemia patients that are at risk of relapse. To achieve this we have studied the gene profiles of a group of patients and identified particular patterns that are predictive of good or inferior clinical outcome. The accurate identification of patients at risk of relapse can improve treatment protocols for patients, tailoring the amount of therapy they receive to their level of risk. This improves not only cure rates, but also minimises secondary side effects of chemotherapy. In addition these gene models have identified drugs that may be of particular benefit in certain patient groups. More recently Dr Beesley has become team leader for the 'NUT midline carcinoma' program, which is described more fully under the Million Dollar Recognition Award.

As part of his Fellowship he has co-written two successful NHMRC Project Grant applications and has applied to the NHMRC for additional funding to support the NMC research program. He has published 8 journal articles during his Fellowship describing the results of his research, with four others under submission. He has been responsible during his Fellowship for presenting research from the laboratory to community groups and scientific audiences, both in Australia and overseas, acknowledging the support from the CLCRF at each opportunity. In 2013 he was successfully awarded two CLCRF Project Grants and a three-year extension to his Fellowship.

Woolworths Research Fellowship (2012 - 2015) Mark N Cruickshank

Title:Identifying Molecular Abnormalities in Childhood Leukaemia to Improve Treatment

Dr Cruickshank has been employed within the CLCRF Laboratory in the Division of Cancer and Leukaemia Research since 2012, and was awarded the Woolworths CLCRF Research Fellowship. This Fellowship has enabled Dr Cruickshank to conduct research aimed at improving risk assessment and treatment of infant and childhood leukaemia. These studies have utilised state-of-the art "genomic" technologies, providing comprehensive characterisation of genetic alterations conferring drug resistance. The unique resources,

including patient specimens and cell lines generated within the CLCRF Laboratory, have been used to identify specific genes that are altered in infant and childhood leukaemia and which may confer resistance to conventional therapies.

These studies have identified potential 'biomarkers' that could predict drug sensitivity/



resistance. The 'biomarkers' under investigation include gene mutations, and alterations in chromosomes and levels of gene-expression.

Dr Cruickshank's work on paediatric leukaemia has identified a class of enzymes that may be involved in resistance to the drug flavopiridol. Using leukaemia cells selected for drug resistance, "genomic" analyses identified mutated genes that encode enzymes that metabolize flavopiridol. Furthermore, analysis of gene expression induced by flavopiridol, identified enzymes involved in neutralizing and eliminating drugs that were activated after drug treatment. Taken together, these results have defined genes that may represent 'biomarkers' of drug resistance and targets for therapy in drug-resistant leukaemia.

As part of his Fellowship, Dr Cruickshank has been involved in experimental design, data analysis and manuscript preparation for projects on infant ALL and childhood ALL, detailed under the CLCRF Triennial Block Grant and the Million Dollar Recognition Awards. In addition, Dr Cruickshank has successfully built collaborations with industry, including negotiations with GlaxoSmithKline and Beijing Genome Institute, and academia locally (University of Western Australia and The Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research) nationally (Murdoch Children's Research Institute) and internationally (Harvard Medical School, USA; National Institute of Genomic Medicine, Mexico; University of British Columbia, Canada). These collaborations have resulted in the provision of costly drugs for testing, expertise in experimental design and complex data-analyses. Dr Cruickshank has presented research from the Laboratory to community groups and scientific audiences both in Australia and overseas, acknowledging the support from the CLCRF at each opportunity.
