CLCRF Receives Generous Donations from MSP Engineering and AGC

CLCRF Annual General Meeting 2018

On the 5th of December at the Wembley Golf Course, Foundation members and invited guests attended the 25th Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Children's Leukaemia & Cancer Research Foundation.

Geoff Cattach, AM, Chairman, and Andrea Alexander, Chief Executive Officer, each gave their reports on the Foundation's operations during 2017/2018 year. Geoff proudly reported that the Foundation managed to maintain and in some instances increase research funding, even with the challenges that today's economy has had on community and corporate support.

The AGM was a great opportunity to address the Foundation's transition to a Million Dollar Partner of Telethon. "With the additional \$500K triggered by our partnership with Telethon, we have been able to expand our research endeavours to continue paediatric brain cancer research as well as a new funding for paediatric sarcoma research" said Geoff.

Dr Rishi Kotecha was also at the 2018 AGM to update the Foundation members and guests about the important research that is being funded by the Children's Leukaemia & Cancer Research Foundation at the Telethon Kids Institute. Rishi explained his current studies into a key new drug, Blinatumomab, and whether it can be safely used to treat infants with acute lymphoblastic leukaemia.



The AGM was followed by the customary CLCRF Christmas Cocktail Party, where members and invited guests enjoyed light refreshments overlooking the picturesque golf course and lake.

Dr Rishi and his team get published

The Foundation received some excellent news earlier this year that a manuscript from Dr Rishi Kotecha and his research team at the Telethon Kids Institute has been provisionally accepted for publication in a high impact journal.

The manuscript is being published in Haematologica, a journal for the broad field of haematology that reports on novel important findings in basic, clinical and translational research.

The manuscript came about from the team's research project funded by CLCRF to identify novel therapeutic approaches for patients with high-risk infant leukaemia.

The team has screened many new drugs and the manuscript focuses on how a particular drug, called Romidepsin, has shown benefits in pre-clinical models of infant leukaemia.

Being published in a high impact journal is important for scientists as it allows the dissemination of information discovered in the laboratory to the broader public of other scientists and other clinicians.

"Without this information being shared, it wont be translated to the clinical setting. If everyone's aware of the information that you discover, then they can translate it to have a direct effect on the patients with cancer." Rishi says.

Important research projects like this would not be possible without the continued support and funding from CLCRF. "Without the support of CLCRF, our program would not exist essentially." Rishi says. "Without the support that we get, we just wouldn't be able to conduct the research we're doing today."

The Foundation would like to commend Rishi and his team for this excellent achievement. We look forward to continue funding the research project and learning more about their developments in infant leukaemia research.

BUILDING EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH TRAVEL GRANTS

We are thrilled to acknowledge the recipients of the Building Excellence in Research Travel Grants - Anastasia Hughes and Anthony Buzzai. These worthy recipients have each received a \$5000 grant from CLCRF, which has allowed them to attend important conferences to advance their respective research.

Anastasia Hughes, PhD student in the Leukaemia and Cancer Genetics team at the Telethon Kids Institute (TKI), received a grant to attend the 3rd Scientific Workshop on Tumour Microenvironment in the Haematological Malignancies and its Therapeutic Targeting in London from the 24th to the 26th of February.

This workshop is designed to promote scientific interaction between participants from all over the world and aims to present strategies to target haematological cancers in their tumour microenvironment. Anastasia will be attending this significant workshop with Dr Laurence Cheung, Senior Research Officer of Leukaemia and Cancer Genetics at TKI. Laurence will be using his CLCRF travel allowance from the Block Grant for this excellent opportunity.

Anthony Buzzai, PhD Candidate in the Cancer Immunology Unit at TIKI, will be using his grant to attend the Keystone Symposia Cancer Metastasis: The Role of Metabolism, Immunity and the Microenvironment in Florence from the 15th to 19th of March. This conference brings together biologists and immunologists who have a common interest in how cellular metabolism influences cell function and it encourages new collaborations between researchers to advance their knowledge.

It is important for the Foundation to continue funding these travel grants in order to provide young researchers with the chance to advance their research. We look forward to hearing more about the excellent opportunity these travel grants have afforded Anastasia and Anthony and we wish them both a safe and successful trip.

OFFSHORE WORKFORCE DONATES

CLCRF Receives Generous Donation from the Greater Enfield Development Project



The Children's Leukaemia & Cancer Research Foundation (CLCRF) was delighted to receive two donations totalling \$11,081.36 from the Greater Enfield Development Project. The project set up an HSE Incentive scheme for the offshore construction and installation of vessels Located 60 km off Exmouth, WA.

The aim of the incentive scheme was to achieve "Zero Lost Time Incident" during construction & installation which involves the elimination of lossproducing events that result in an injury, property damage, or a lost work day. This outcome was successfully achieved.

The offshore workforce was asked to identify 5 worthwhile charities that they have heard of or had personal experiences with. CLCRF was one of five charities selected and approved by the TechnipFMC Compliance Team to receive a donation. The presentation of the donations took place on Friday 7 December at the TechnipFMC Office in West Perth.

SOUTHWEST BIKETREK

Kicking, or pedalling, off on Sunday 7 October was the annual Southwest Bike Trek. The bike trek started at Mueller Park in Subiaco and finished in Augusta on Saturday the 13th of October.

The trek was organised by Foundation member, Eric Maddock, with the help of Lions and Rotary Clubs.

12 riders took part in the 600km bike ride, raising a Total of \$36,376 to help fund important research into childhood cancers. This brings the total funds raised over the past 16 years close to \$700,000!

Riders rode through the wonderful southwest towns of Fairbridge, Harvey, Bunbury, Busselton, Margaret River and Augusta.

Participating in the bike ride this time was Katelyn Lush, Executive Assistant of CLCRF. Katelyn diligently trained for several months with the help of Eric, who she thanks for taking the time to make sure she was prepared.

"In the beginning I never thought I'd be able to actually do it and travel the entire distance but I am beyond ecstatic and overwhelmed to have reached the end with a fantastic bunch of riders and support crew." Katelyn says. "You can do anything if you set your mind to it, I did!"

The riders were fortunate enough to enjoy lovely weather throughout the trek. "7 days on the bike and we only had a tiny bit of rain, which for a first time trekker, was very much appreciated." Katelyn says. The team were overwhelmed by the amount of support they received from local communities of WA's South West during the trek, who deserve acknowledgement.

"The support from all the Lions and Rotary clubs as well as the Binningup Senior Citizens, Business & Professional Women - Harvey, Fairbridge Village, Camp Grace, Eaton Scout Camp, Mooba Coffee, Jarra Infusions, The Beach Shack Cafe and Swings Kitchen made sure that everyone slept well and no rider went hungry.

CLCRF's Christmas Appeal took the humble ornament to the next level, teaming up with The Karalee on Preston in a unique incentive for patrons to donate.


Visitors to the venue could purchase a Bauble over the bar for any donation amount they choose and then place it on the beautiful Christmas tree.

JOHN'S JOURNEY



RAISING CRUCIAL FUNDS IN MEMORY OF THREE BRAVE BOYS

DHS STAFF JOIN THE FIGHT AGAINST CHILDHOOD CANCER

A father whose five year old son died from brain cancer has pledged to work tirelessly to raise money for childhood cancer research to help other families fighting for their children's lives.

Department of Human Services Social Work Support Manager, Jon Wannberg's son Ricky died in 1996.

"My boy was one of three from separate families who passed away from brain cancer within a month of each other – they were really good friends," said Jon.

His colleagues at the Morley Service Centre in Western Australia have been quick to support him. Jon and the team's latest fundraising effort saw him shave his head and much loved facial hair, generating more than \$1000.

The families have established the 3 Boys Legacy (3BL), a brain cancer research project administered by the Children's Leukaemia ϑ Cancer Research Foundation (CLCRF).

Fundraising efforts by 3BL and CLCRF have raised much needed money for equipment and research, which has greatly helped the team at the Telethon Kids Institute for Child Health Research.

"I'm always looking for an opportunity to raise funds for children's cancer research, whether it's running a marathon in England or Sweden, or having my beard and head shaved clean here in the Morley Service Centre," Jon said.

CLCRF Executive Officer Wendy Kearns said the quest to find cures for childhood cancer is one of medicine's greatest success stories.

"Fifty years ago only two percent of children with cancer survived and medical research alone has improved overall survival rates to 80 percent," Wendy said.

"However with childhood cancer still the leading cause of death from disease in Australian children, there is more work to be done.

"There are still particular childhood cancers, such as brain tumours and neuroblastoma, with survival rates as low as 50 percent."

Jon said he is thrilled and humbled by his colleagues at the Department of Human Services who always support his fundraising efforts. "This shows how committed department staff are – they genuinely care about people who need assistance and help wherever they can.

"Reducing the number of kids we lose to cancer is really important, not just to me but for so many other families."

This was a big step for Ruben who previously avoided haircuts and was proud of his long, curly cut.

The shave took place a few weeks before Christmas and Ruben sent the photos and videos to his friend in a show of support. Ruben's dad, Paul, worked as an Oncology nurse and in the palliative care sector – and has raised his son to show compassion to those who are struggling with their health. Paul said that's not the only reason Ruben decided to shave off his hair.
